Potentate Message

Greetings Nobles!

Zuhrah has been alive with activity these last couple months both on site and across the Twin Cities. I want to publicly express my gratitude for the job that Bill Yungk (and Ronda) did hosting the Litchfield Pub Crawl and offer thanks to all the Nobles that participated. I also want to thank Carole Wurden and her whole team for the outstanding job that she has done hosting our Spring Flower Fundraiser.

The Mission of Shriners International is to:

- Be the premier fraternal organization for men of good character.
- Provide attractive, quality programs and services for its members, their families, and their friends in a spirit of fun, fellowship, and social camaraderie.
- Foster self-improvement through leadership, education, the perpetuation of moral values and community involvement.
- Serve mankind through the resources of its philanthropy, Shriners Children's.

As I reflect on the mission of Shriners International, I remember three notable speakers that I have had the opportunity to hear speak on these very topics this year (especially the third bullet point).

Leaders of good character are not born, they are made. They develop their skills and abilities through constant learning, practice, and feedback. They also possess certain qualities that set them apart from others and inspire others to follow them. Some of these qualities are:

- High integrity and unquestionable character. According to Dr. Doris Kearns Goodwin, a world-renowned presidential historian, and the author of seven (7) books, great leaders grow from personal challenges that shape how they lead. They do not compromise their values or principles for personal gain or convenience. They act with consistency and transparency, and they hold themselves and others accountable for their actions and decisions. (Leadership in Turbulent Times - Goodwin, 2018)
- The Four (4) A's of leadership: adaptability, agility, accountability, and a winning attitude. As Coach Mike Krzyzewski (Coach K), the legendary basketball coach and the author of

Leading with the Heart: Coach K's Successful Strategies for Basketball, Business, and Life, he shares that great leaders are flexible and adaptable to changing situations and challenges. They are agile and responsive to new opportunities and threats. They are accountable for their results and outcomes, and they learn from their mistakes and failures. They have a winning attitude that motivates them to pursue excellence and overcome obstacles. (Krzyzewski, 2001) Coach K also shared the best advice that he ever got from his mom was to "get on the right bus". By "bus" he meant going to the right place with the right people. He finally shared the power of just one player (or person) screaming "Let's Go!" at the right time to motivate a team!

- A culture of citizenship that serves the country and a higher purpose. Great leaders are not self-centered or egoistic. They are aware of their social and civic responsibilities, and they contribute to the well-being and progress of their country and humanity. They have a vision and a mission that transcends their personal interests and goals. They serve a higher purpose that gives meaning and direction to their lives and actions. One example of such a leader is General John Kelly, who served as a four-star general in the US Marine Corps and retired after 45 years of service, he served as the 5th Head of Homeland Security and then as the White House Chief of Staff from 2017-2019. In his speech at the Center for a New American Security in 2017, he said: "Service to our country is not just about the military. It is about being a good citizen, a good neighbor, a good friend. It is about giving back to the community, the nation, the world. It is about living a life of honor, courage, and commitment." (Kelly, 2017) When I had the opportunity to hear him in a small group setting recently, he reminded us that the values that inspire duty are taught. In an increasingly digital world that focuses on catering to the individual desires it is important to stay grounded in a spirit of service.

These are some of the qualities that make great leaders. By cultivating these qualities, anyone can become a great leader and make a positive difference in the world.

In the spirit of this service, I would like to make an appeal to our Nobles to plan to attend the Hennepin County Fair and help with one of Zuhrah's largest fundraisers for the year. Please contact our Chief Rabban, Noble Cliff Bailey, to sign up for a volunteer shift to help us both represent and raise money for our Fraternity.

As we look forward to the next few months, we have the Twin Cities Hospital Gala, the Hennepin County Fair, our June Stated Meeting will also be Zuhrah's 140th Birthday party (so come have some cake and toast the occasion), the 150th Imperial Session for Shriners International, our Ice Cream Social and the Midwest Shrine Association (MSA) Summer Session.

Finally, Ret. General John Kelly reminds us that we now live in a world that has a month to celebrate who anyone is individually. However, we only have one day to celebrate those who "gave it all" for the freedoms that we enjoy. 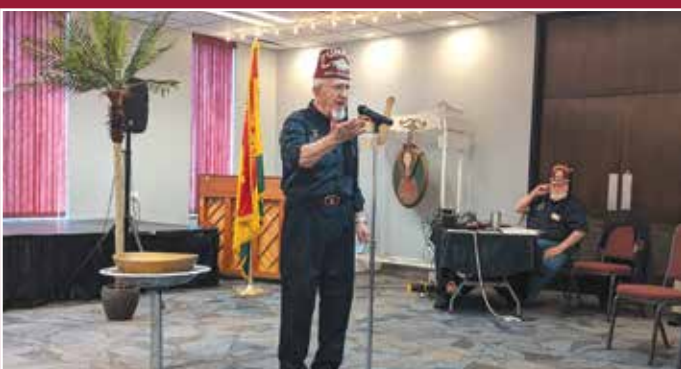

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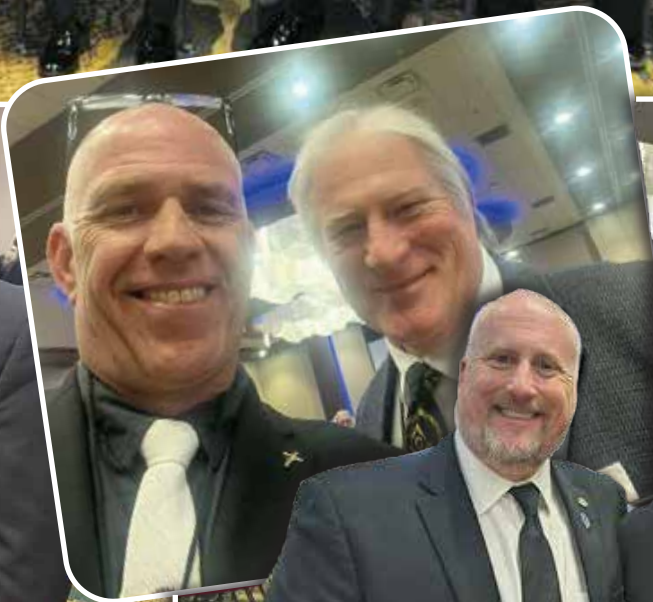

Arguably

there are several ways around an apple. One should hesitate in referencing the apple as a task, problem, or issue. The connotation cast shade on what lays in front of you, commanding your attention. Such can be found when working with our equine partners. If one were afforded the rare occasion to attend a clinic or a Horse Expo, they could spend hours among the educated and those who entertain that notion and not find the help you need. On the other hand, to glean techniques and a variety of nuances to help your own performance should you be open to listen, does make for time well spent. There really isn't anything tricky or laid up in historical archives away from the public. Repetition and Patience will take you most everywhere you want to go. You stand abstinent and only yield when your horse yields. Horses have "tells," that one should look for and once given in to your cue, you need to relax and let your horse do the same. Then begins the bond that builds between the horse and you for they, are looking to please. Horses come and go. We take care of them the best way we know how. Keep in mind, that horse, you will know half your life but they, will know you all of theirs. Make it a happy one so that should you finally reach the pearly gates on high, they will come running from the pasture to greet you. So many of us set aside a limit of time to spend with our animals. They don't understand time and if you're not in a spot to stop what you're working on, then the time with the horse doesn't stop until they have yielded to your lesson. Temperance allows the mind to be governable. Give that virtue unto your horse. Both of you will be better for it.

Ranch

Improvements slowed during this early spring; however, we finally did schedule and get the well cleaned. Water needed to be

stockpiled in additional tanks for the herd, so they didn't go without. Sure, makes for a more decent cup of coffee. As a Norwegian, I can appreciate that. Still need to catch some corners and cross fencing of the front pasture so we can manage that paddock and pasture better. Keeping in mind new fencing for the front entry, and what was installed 37 years ago is in poor repair and aesthetically needs a "facelift." Good fences result in good neighbors, whom we have a common goal as both of us would like to provide the best experience for our borders and guest along with streamlining some of our practices to make it convenient for staff. There has been some discussion regarding obstacles and training devices more permanent at the facility. Thinking that they don't have to be congregated and could thus be disperse around the ranch so they would blend in and create separation for people as they work with their horse on specific obstacles. But we still don't allow horses to tear up the lawn. We get enough foot traffic for that through the side door. Speaking of our "Lawn," to the North of the Ranch Building. The eye soar that was broken scrapes of plywood were cleaned up and ground prepped, seeded, raked and watered so we should have some grass growing to re-establish some visual pleasantries around the fire pit this summer. People tend to be like cattle, in that regard. Some being more set in their ways than others it tends to be a full time job diverting traffic for just a brief period of time, and still maintain our fire exit.

Horse

health has again seen a few members lose their equine partners. At the end of April, Boarders hosted a "celebration of Life" as it were, with a potluck and service. I believe it was open

to the membership, boarders and any public that knew about it. But it was not specifically advertised. New horses have already come onto the property to replace those that passed, and we are sitting in the low 70's for a total herd count. Trails are closed due to moisture as this article drafting. Many of our members and Boarders alike are equally anxious to use the park and its trails. Three Rivers, who manage the park, had a spring training event that was held over in Baker Park area for those who help with trail monitoring and assist with venues that the park has through-out the year. Thank-you to those members/boarders who provide a direct presence from our facility to the Three Rivers Park District. It's time well spent.

Parade

As we wait for the start of parade season around the next bend in the calendar. Capt. Gretton and Lieut. Huber notified the masses to be in the saddle end of April. Looks to be a good turnout this year. Talk about having some competition at the Midwest in LaCrosse this year has stirred many a soul to be a part of something tangible.

Trailer should be getting put back together prior to our first parade upon the issuance of this Arabian which is St. Louis Park's Spectacular Parade.



Quartermaster Hart, along with 2-3 others collected and transported the saddle pads up to the Rockford Fire Dept., who ran them through the washing machines and drier to set us up with clean pads for the year. A modest gratuity to the Rockford Dept. helped to facilitate that endeavor.

Most all pads can be washed/dried in regular machines. The machines fire dept., use have a spin cycle to extract 99% of the moisture out of the garment prior to going to the dryer. The heavy FR coats and gear require the machines to operate 5-6 X the revolutions that a normal machine would provide. Hence the normal machine would leave the blanket with so much moisture inside of it, that it would not fluff up like it should.

Found one of our Boarders, who helps us with fencing and parading, is quite the seamstress. Some of our Parade equipment was placed in her care to repair and/or replace.

Membership has talked of Black wool blankets to use under our pads to help keep them cleaner as we complete 15-18 parades this summer and 5 blankets were ordered after this year's Expo and we hope to have them in use for St. Louis Park.

After the fire that took our last facility, our herd was forced to move up to our current location and leave the horses tied to the trailer for a while until we got some fences built. Not that I was around at the time, but through my years of experience and background I can with a glance tell right where the first post was placed. Subsequent article I will reveal the answer.

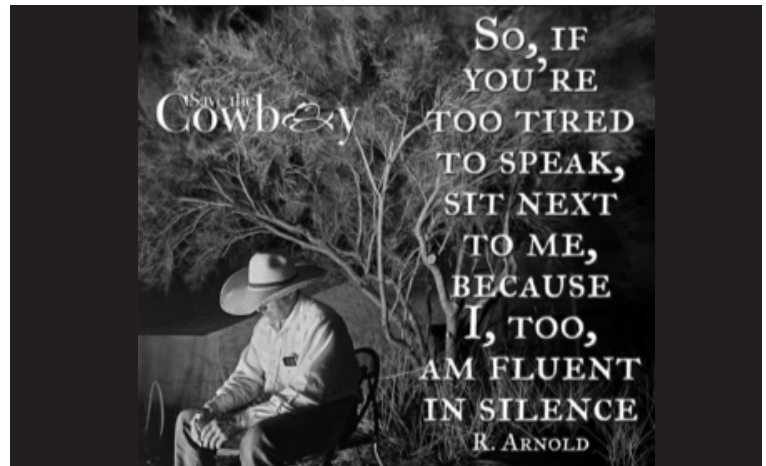
